
Long Term Care Supports in WI







Introduction

Today we will provide family caregivers with information about the options for long-term care services that provide funds for respite, along with information about the RCAW grant programs that can be used after exploring long-term care funds.



Long-term Care in Wisconsin

Over 85,000 children and adults with disabilities and older adults in Wisconsin rely on home and community-based services (HCBS), such as personal care, home health care, and respite, to stay in their homes and out of expensive Medicaid-funded institutions.



Long-term Care Programs (WI)

The age of the care recipient will determine eligibility for a funding source. Additional eligibility may be required for each funder based on diagnosis, needs, or levels of care.

CLTS & CCOP

Children's Long-Term Support (CLTS) and Children's Community Options Program (CCOP) are programs run through the Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) to provide services (including respite care) for children with disabilities.

Families work with a service coordinator to determine the child's needs and the services to be funded.

CLTS Waiver Services

A waiver lets states use Medicaid to fund additional non-medical services and supports not normally offered.

Eligibility requirements:

- Be younger than age 22.
- Be eligible for Wisconsin Medicaid.
- Live at home, in foster care, or in another approved setting.
- Need a level of care that people get at:
 - A hospital.
 - A nursing home.
 - An institution for people with developmental disabilities.
- Be able to get safe, required care at home or in the community.



Katie Beckett Medicaid

Katie Beckett Medicaid serves children under 19 who live at home and have certain health care needs.

Katie Beckett Medicaid helps children who:

- Have complex medical needs.
- Have long-term disabilities.
- Have mental health needs.
- Want to receive home and community-based services instead of living in a hospital or institution.



When you are considering the enrollment process, you may find that the child in your care could be eligible for a few different programs. This overview can help you understand the benefits of each program. It has information about Wisconsin Medicaid (Katie Beckett, BadgerCare Plus), the Children's Long-Term Support (CLTS) Program, and the Children's Community Options Program (CCOP). The child can be enrolled in one or more of these programs depending on your family's needs.

CHILDREN'S LONG-TERM SUPPORT PROGRAM



Wisconsin's CLTS Program supports children with disabilities and their families by providing services that help children grow and live their best lives in their home and community.

Each child and family works with a support and service coordinator to develop a plan to meet their goals. Funding can be used to access a range of services based on an assessment.

BIRTH TO 3 PROGRAM

The Wisconsin Birth to 3 Program serves families with children under the age of 3 who have delays or disabilities. Once enrolled, a team of professional service providers works with your family to support growth and learning. Family culture, beliefs, and individual needs help shape how services are delivered.

Katie Beckett Medicaid provides access to Wisconsin Medicaid services for children with disabilities whose parents' income is too high to enroll in other Medicaid programs

Children can receive medically necessary services and equipment through this program.

The Children's Community Options Program can pay for a range of supports and services that other insurance or Medicaid can't.

It can pay for a one-time need or can build on other supports and services, including the CLTS Waiver Program

Kinship Care

Kinship Care is a program to help support a child who lives outside of his or her home with the relative. The child may be living temporarily or for the long term with a relative.

Kinship care helps a family support a child in the home of a relative that might be under stress or when the child has experienced abuse or neglect.

With this support, placing a child in a foster home or another out-of-home care setting may be avoided. For children in the child welfare system who cannot continue living at home with his or her parents, Kinship Care may be another placement option.

Programs for Adults

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Family Care

Family Care is a Medicaid long-term care program for older adults and adults with disabilities. The goal is to get members the services they need to live in a home setting when possible.

Family Care offers long-term care under one benefit program. Long-term care is a service or support a person may need because:

- They have a disability
- They are older
- They have a lasting (chronic) illness



Family Care Partners

There are two main groups that work with Family Care members:

Aging and disability resource centers (ADRCs)—These centers serve the public and offer information. They also help with issues that affect older adults, people with disabilities, and their families. ADRCs make it easy to learn about resources near you.

Managed care organizations (MCOs)—MCOs coordinate services for the Family Care program. When a person enrolls, they become a member of an MCO. The MCO makes sure members get services based on need, situation, and preference.

IRIS

IRIS (Include, Respect, I Self-Direct) is a program for adults with disabilities and elderly people in Wisconsin. It is a self-directed program. When you join IRIS, you get to decide what goods, support, and services will help you meet your goals. A budget is made just for you. It is based on your long-term care needs and goals. Using your budget, you will help create a support and service plan to meet your needs.



IRIS Partners

Aging and disability resource centers (ADRCs): information center

IRIS consultant agencies (ICA): can help you manage your own care. They also handle the day-to-day operations of the IRIS program. You will choose an IRIS consultant who will work closely with you to meet your needs for long-term care services.

<u>Fiscal employer agents (FEA)</u>: can help you choose and manage the workers you hire (background checks, payroll, taxes, etc.).

IRIS Self-Directed Personal Care Oversight Agency: allows you to hire, train, and oversee your own personal care workers.

MetaStar: works for DHS to operate a complaint and grievance hotline. Their role is to help solve problems that arise.

PACE: Program of All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly

PACE is a national program that provides older adults with:

- Health care
- Long-term care
- Prescription drugs

PACE aims to help its members live in a home setting for as long as they can.

In Wisconsin, PACE is an option for people who live in Kenosha, Milwaukee, Racine, and Waukesha County.

NFCSP & AFCSP

National Family Caregiver Support Program (NFCSP) provides services and supports that help family members and informal caregivers, such as a neighbor or friend, care for older adults at home. The NFCSP is available to any person providing care to an adult age 60+.

Wisconsin Alzheimer's Family and Caregiver Support Program (AFCSP) is like the NFSCP but serves individuals with Alzheimer's.

These programs provide caregivers a small amount of funds that can be used for services, including respite.





RCAW Grants for Caregivers

Caregiver Respite Grant Program (CRGP)

Our Caregiver Respite Grant Program (CRGP) provides financial support for family caregivers for up to five days of respite care within a 30-day period. The grant helps you pay for one-on-one personal care from the caregiver of your choice for your loved one living with disabilities or special needs.

This grant is available when financial support through other caregiver support or long-term care waiver programs are not available or have been used up.



Supplemental Respite Grant Program (SRGP)

Our Supplemental Respite Grant Program (SRGP) supports primary caregivers by providing \$250 every 90 days (up to \$1,000 per year) of funding for supplemental respite services. This grant allows you to hire the person of your choice to help you with housekeeping, meal prep, laundry, lawn care, snow removal, transportation, and technology.
